Paola has discovered a new unheralded women's movement of activist grandmothers in 15 countries on five continents, and she documents 120 of the women in her new book. Paola is giving 100 percent of her author royalties to the Grandmother-to-Grandmother campaign of the Stephen Lewis Foundation in Toronto, which helps grandmothers in 15 African countries who are caring for AIDS orphans. Paola dedicated the book to her granddaughters (ages 4 and 7) "and grandchildren everywhere." Her other books have received accolades and made the best-seller lists, and this one is off to a good start: The Washington Post calls it "a big, beautiful book too rich to stay on a coffee table."
